LSI is hosting a Volunteer Income Tax Assistance site to support refugees or immigrants in filing their taxes. Filing is free for participants and is completed securely by tax certified volunteers. Immigrants are at an increased risk for scams, frauds and predatory practices around tax season- filing taxes properly, securely and on time can help to protect their identity, secure loans in the future, apply for financial aid, and even to apply for citizenship. **USCRI has announced a new program: READY4Life** is open for anyone who self-identifies as a refugee, immigrant, or asylum-seeker and is aged 14-24. Documentation of their status is NOT required, and they do not have to have come through the R&P program. The program is a 16-hour course focused on communication skills, relationship building, conflict management, and emotional self-regulation. Clients participate in surveys related to their experiences and can receive up to \$95 worth of Wal-Mart gift cards. They are also eligible for 8 months of case management. A New Scholarship is available to "people with lived refugee experience" in Iowa who want to pursue a social work degree at the University of Iowa! This scholarship does not require the applicant to have a refugee visa - only the experience of forced displacement. This includes, but is not limited to, asylum seekers, undocumented folks, survivors of torture and trafficking, and folks with refugee visas and lottery visas.

This will be available for students starting Fall 2023. The scholarship aims to pay as much tuition as possible for each person it's awarded to. It prioritizes master's level students first, then bachelor's level students. Students can be full time or part time and they can use the scholarship for summer tuition too. The University of Iowa Program was chosen because it has multiple locations across Iowa and an online program, so is **available to anyone in Iowa, without requiring them to relocate to Iowa City.**

## The Catholic Legal Immigrant Network (CLINIC) has a self Study Opportunity: <u>Completing the Application for</u> <u>Naturalization Form N-400</u>

The Iowa Department of Health and Human Services, Bureau of Refuge Services (BRS) has implemented a 'services referral form' (see form here). This form is to be used as <u>the</u> mechanism to access services by beneficiaries (refugees), referring agencies and anyone seeking support through BRS. <u>Settle In for Ukrainians</u>, an initiative launched by the <u>Cultural Orientation Resource Exchange</u>, is designed to directly engage newly arrived Ukrainians resettling in the United States. Settle In serves as a touchpoint to disseminate vital, correct information in an interactive format tied to early resettlement services, employment, housing, and education. In addition to posts and the ability to directly message with trained and experienced Ukrainian- and Russian-speaking Digital Community Liaisons, Settle In for Ukrainians will host live-stream events on Facebook.

**The Office of Refugee Resettlement** has issued a <u>fact sheet</u> that outlines benefits and services for Ukrainian humanitarian parolees. The fact sheet, featured on the <u>ORR homepage</u>, is in English, but by using the website's translation feature in the top right-hand corner, it can be translated into over 80 languages, including Ukrainian and Russian.

**Every Kid Sports is a national nonprofit that helps income-restricted families to pay for youth sports registration fees** by providing up to \$150 per children, up to three times a year, through their signature program, The Every Kid Sports Pass. To qualify, families must fill out an application at <u>everykidsports.org</u> and submit a picture of a Medicaid, SNAP, or WIC document with the child's name and a date from within 12 months. The Affordable Connectivity Program is an FCC benefit program that helps ensure that households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare and more. See <u>Affordability Connectivity Program</u> for more information.

**The Weatherization Assistance Program is accepting applications**. This grant program was established to help reduce the heating and cooling costs for low income persons, particularly the elderly, disabled, and children, by improving the energy efficiency of their homes, thereby reducing the households' energy bills. This also is one resource to help with a past due bill or disconnection. For Story County, contact Mid-Iowa Community Action, Inc. (MICA) at 230 SE 16th St., Suite 100, Ames, IA 50010, 515-956-3333. **Covid-19 Vaccinations (including covid-19 bivalent booster):** If you are still in need of a FREE covid-19 vaccine, appointments can be scheduled at Story County Public Health (1114 Duff Avenue, Ames), 1-800-945-8563. You do not need insurance or ID. If you need help with scheduling, you may contact Karen Stein at: 515-450-0272.

**Free COVID-19 Testing Program:** Each U.S. household is eligible to order four free at-home COVID-19 tests. Order tests online at <u>covid.gov/tests</u>; the website is available in English and Spanish, and <u>NRC-RIM has guides</u> in several other languages that help people navigate the site. The U.S. Government has set up a hotline for people who have trouble using the online ordering site or need help in languages other than English. Call **1-800-232-0233** from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. ET to order four tests per household. *This hotline closes at 5 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays*.

Help is just 3 digits away. Call 911 for emergencies. Call 211 for information and community resources. Call 988 for suicide intervention and crisis support.

**The Vermont Language Justice Project created videos on how to pick up prescriptions at pharmacies.** The videos have been created for many common refugee languages, as well as Dari, Pashto, and Ukrainian.

## Easterseals Resource for Iowa refugees and immigrants with a disability/ongoing medical concern

Easterseals Iowa has Durable Medical Equipment (DME) available at a nominal cost, which can be waived. The individual is then able to use the item for as long as they need it. Examples of DME include hospital beds, wheelchairs and grab bars.

**Easterseals has a Lending Library of over 2,000 devices.** They can help people identify what devices might be helpful for them and they can borrow the device for 30 days to find out if it helps or not. Many of the devices are geared toward concerns common among those who have lived in an area with sustained war/conflict, such as a missing limb, hearing loss, or mobility problems. Some examples are devices to make it easier to prep and cook with one hand, an alarm that shakes the bed if you can't hear a typical alarm clock and canes that adapt for walking on uneven ground. **The LSI Refugee and Immigrant Wellness (therapy and case management) fliers** have been translated into additional languages: Arabic, Burmese, English, French, Karen, Kinyamulenge, Nepali, Somali, Spanish, Swahili, and Tigrinya.

**Mental Health Emergency Hotline.** Individuals/community leaders can dial "988" on their phone and will be able to have mental health support for crisis and suicide prevention. Trained mental health professionals around the country are available 24 hours, 7 days per week to answer the calls, listen, and if needed connect them with local support. Language line is available.

The Office of Refugee Resettlement has put together some great multi-lingual resources for disaster preparation (including winter storms, hypothermia and frostbite). The booklet has been translated into Amharic, Arabic, Burmese, Chinese, Farsi, French, Karenni, Kinyarwanda, Nepali, Karen, Sgaw Karen, Somali, Swahili, Tibetan, and Tigrinya. The English version is also on the website, with print-ready versions in the languages listed above. Also attached is additional content on Hypothermia and Frostbite in <u>Dari</u> and <u>Pashto</u>
